Ideas to Make Learning Fun

- ◆ Develop a homework schedule or routine. Discuss what your child learned in school each day.
- ◆ Select a 'just right' book and read daily with your child. This means when your child reads the first page of a book he/she makes only three to five mistakes.
- ◆ Use your weekly reading strategies.
- ◆ Read on a daily basis with your child. Ask your child to answer questions about the story/retell the story.
- ◆ Have fun with reading throughout the day. (i.e.: read signs, make up rhymes, count syllables in words and visit the library.)
